Frequently Asked Questions:

What should families in the school district expect in terms of receiving instructional packets to support student learning?

The first set of instructional packets was released today. These packets were diligently and thoughtfully prepared by our staff at all levels. They are intended to keep your child's learning sharp and mind active. As of right now, the materials are a review of your child's previous learning. If you indicated to us on our previous survey that you have internet, you will be able to access the instructional packets electronically on your school's website, district website or through Clever.

If you did not respond to the survey or indicated that you did not have internet access, paper packets were mailed via the US Postal Service. Packets for K-8 were mailed March 24. Grades 9-12 will go out in today's mail. Electronic materials are available now.

Thank you for your patience as we have prepared these materials. We will be reaching out with a survey to gather your feedback on the packets as we continue to learn how to best deliver learning remotely. We look forward to working with families and becoming more proficient in our new remote environment.
